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# From the President

It is said that in the midst of every crisis, lies great opportunity.

Cricket over the last few years has known much of 'crisis', but from the tough conversations cricket had to have we are now starting to see some significant positive changes in the sport.

I believe much of this change is because the game at the elite level is correcting its course – in part by leading Australian sport in the way we recognise and reward our female athletes, and by rediscovering the connection to the true source of Australian cricket's success over decades past - club and domestic cricket. Our elite player groups have recognised the need for change and have delivered a brand of cricket that Australians can be proud of.

The ACA's constitution directs us to be the 'voice' of Australia's professional players - past, present and future. This is the lens we apply to everything we do and every position we take – to support our membership, but always with an eye to the future. We must leave the game better than we found it. It has been this way since the inception of the ACA in 1997, when our founding players spoke important truth to power when it needed to be spoken.

What has always given us the strength to do this is that we speak with your voice. What we achieved from the last MOU is what you asked us to advocate for. The list is significant.

With a foundation based on an appropriate share of the game's revenues, we achieved a gender equity pay model and one collective agreement for both men and women - in a first for Australian sport. This included the removal of clauses in contracts which differentiated women from their male counterparts and paved the way for the recently introduced parental leave policy that will provide 12-months paid leave for birth and adoption; and a guaranteed contract extension for the following contract year, in line with players' contractual arrangements.

We achieved more investment into local cricket through a \$30 million-dollar Grassroots Cricket Fund, initiated this year.

We have also argued on the need for big governance changes in Cricket, such as the Australian Cricket Commission, the re-empowerment of State and Local Cricket; supporting local clubs and re-connecting elite level players and administrators to local cricket.

We should all understand that these are incredibly significant moments for our sport. It is no overstatement to characterise these ongoing changes as a 'quiet revolution' in cricket.

These are the investments - the ethical, contractual and governance changes that if properly implemented will, in very practical ways, achieve the much-needed course correction for cricket overall.

They are an indicator of the growth and maturity of the Australian Cricketers' Association.

Since 1997, our Membership has grown from a handful of players to over 1,500.

Female cricketers have become both Members of the ACA and party to the one Memorandum of Understanding with Cricket Australia. The hard-earned gender equity remuneration model has been achieved and now must be built on.

The wellbeing of players now makes up a large part of what we do. For current players, the GamePlan Player Development Program is administered jointly with CA to support current and transitioning Players to better equip themselves for life on and off the field. Our Past Player Program is delivering much needed support for the generations who played our game, predominantly for the love of it.

There is also the development and management of the Grassroots Cricket Fund, run jointly with Cricket Australia, funded by the Players from their share of the game's revenues to support community cricket clubs.

The commencement of the Australian Cricket Council, where for the first time, the ACA takes a seat alongside cricket's most senior leaders, is a significant moment in the governance of cricket in Australia. I commend Earl Eddings,

Cricket Australia's Chairman, for his role in implementing this recommendation from

The Ethics Centre report.

Significantly, we have also assumed responsibility for managing the Australian Cricketers' Retirement Account (ACRA). The ACA has driven the fund's modernisation into a more sophisticated lump-sum and annuity model with interest and other investment earnings to be allocated to the players for the first time.

To this, we are pleased to have announced the ACRA Board of Management, comprising the independent chair Greg Healy; ACA's nominee Janet Torney, Todd Shand; Dominique Hogan-Doran, and Craig Bingham.

Plainly the ACA is growing, taking on very significant financial and wellbeing responsibilities for its Members and using our advocacy to promote necessary change.

As both a driver and the subject of change we must look to our structures to ensure we are ready for the important role the ACA will continue to play in the years ahead.

That's why we have renewed our own governance arrangements and constitution against these modern challenges.

The most appropriate form of legal entity to govern the ACA is to change from an incorporated Association to a Public Company Limited by Guarantee (like other large not-for-profit enterprises, charities and sporting organisations).

The renewal and strengthening of our governance also provides context to revise our Constitution's wording to the new 'all of game' MOU, the gender-neutral contracting of players and to keep pace with the changing nature of the global game.

This includes:

- Principles to both guide and drive fairness and diversity on the ACA Executive Committee;
- The numbers, status and skills of ACA Executive Committee Members;
- The roles and terms of office for those Executive Committee Members; and
- The express ability of the Executive Committee to do things like create sub Committees to deal with ACRA, risk, audit, cricket and other matters.

I have confidence that because of the tough conversations cricket had to have, and the positive changes that have emerged as a result, the game and the ACA are much better placed to deal with the future challenges we will face.

There is now both an understanding of the issues, and the governance we need to drive the solutions of more investment in local, grade and grassroots cricket; a permanent and stronger connection between the elite and local levels, and the genuine advancement of cricket for all genders.


I am pleased to be continuing as Chairman of our newly-expanded Board and I am personally thrilled that Shane Watson has agreed to take on the President's role.

# **Chief Executive's Report**

I am pleased to be able to deliver another report to members, after a strong year for the ACA and its membership. We have witnessed many outstanding on-field performances from an individual and team perspective, both on a domestic and international front.



Most notably - congratulations must go to the Australia Female team, after their magnificent win at the T20 World Cup. Well done to all players and staff involved in such a successful campaign.

The ACA are thrilled to have launched several major initiatives with our members' support in 2018-19, including the \$30 million Grassroots Cricket Fund, an enhanced retirement scheme (ACRA) and the re-developed GamePlan Personal Development and Wellbeing program.

The Grassroots Cricket Fund in particular will be a lasting legacy of this playing group; an unprecedented \$30 million commitment from current players to the grassroots level is something that has not been done anywhere in the world, by any playing group, in any sport.

Our players should rightly be celebrated for this.

This year, the ACA also secured two additional matches for WNCL, an additional match and improved season structure for the male domestic One Day Cup, additional Australia A opportunities and an improved BBL schedule going forward. Driven by players, these improvements demonstrate their commitment to the game and to one another; both for this generation and next.

Off the field, the ACA has continued to strengthen our ties to the game at all levels.

A key part of the year was the review into the culture of cricket by The Ethics Centre, of which the ACA participated with a detailed submission supported by member feedback.

And since this time, the ACA has endeavoured to work collaboratively with Cricket Australia, on helping them to deliver on the recommendations put forward by The Ethics Centre.

From a past player perspective, we have continued to deliver our industry-leading offerings to members via our health and wellbeing grants, our Premier Cricket Program opportunities, our game development opportunities, our member benefits and discounts, our member functions and Health Check Days.

It is truly rewarding to be able to support members beyond their career, acknowledging their significant contribution to the game in the past.

The delivery of our programs has always been a key measure for the ACA, and in 2018-19 there was much to celebrate on this front.

# Membership & Member Programs

After a re-structure of this department in 2017-18, the member programs team again delivered upon objectives, enhancing the services provided to players past and present.

The ACA membership grew to 1547 in 2018-19, which is a testament to the hard work of Clea Smith, Kirsty Lamb, Megan Pauwels and the six state coordinators in this area.

Highlights included:

- 67% of past player members accessed a Personal Development Grant
- 124 members were supported through the Medical Support Scheme
- 472 members attended over 1000 Health Fair Day appointments
- 767 ACA coach appearances, via the ACA Game Development Program

And in her first year in the role, congratulations to Justine Whipper on the way she has developed our GamePlan program for current and transitioning players, with the help of her team of Kylie Crowley, Carla Dziwoki and the 13 Player Development Managers around the country.

Highlights included:

- Implementation of Individual Development Plans for contracted players with 62% player completion rate in the first season.
- Implementation of first ACA/CA Player Development Advisory Committee
- Implementation of Community Champion Award with Australian Cricket Awards and recognition of Moises Henriques contribution to de-stigmatising Mental Health

 Development of a new Wellbeing education framework

# **Premier Cricket Program**

This program has now delivered over \$4 million to 102 Premier Clubs, to support ACA members playing, coaching or mentoring at Premier Cricket level around the country. We have now had 269 members engaged in the Program, with 357 grants provided since 2015.

In 2018-19 Highlights included:

- \$1 million invested into Premier Cricket:
- 101 clubs received between \$5,000 and \$15,000;
- 183 ACA members involved in the Program
- 46 new roles created within Premier Clubs due to ACA Premier Cricket Funding
- 77 members would not have been involved in Premier Cricket if it wasn't for ACA funding

#### **ACA Masters**

The ACA Masters visited Cobram Barooga this season, conducting clinics, awarding a scholarship to a talented local junior, and playing in a T20 against a local side. The Masters engaged over 200 local kids via school clinics, player speeches, T20 blast carnivals, net sessions and school visits.



# ACA Player Agent Accreditation Scheme

The ACA Player Agent Accreditation Scheme was launched in October 2012. Under the MOU, CA, State Associations and BBL Teams have agreed that (with only limited exceptions), as from 1 April 2013, they will only deal with agents who have been accredited under the scheme in discussions for playing contracts or CA Marketing Contracts.

The scheme is operated by the ACA and overseen by an Accreditation Board, consisting of two ACA nominees, one CA nominee and two nominees agreed between CA and the ACA.

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# **International Cricket**

The Australian Women's Team were crowned T20 World Champions in the Caribbean which was the highlight of a season that also featured T20 and ODI series wins against New Zealand and Pakistan.

The Australian Men's Team had a tough start to 2018/19, with an away series loss to Pakistan in the UAE before a home ODI series loss to South Africa, drawn T20 series against India and Test and T20 series losses to India.

The Australian summer finished on a high for the men's team with a Test series win against Sri Lanka. The team then went onto India where they achieved away T20I and ODI series victories to take some good momentum leading into the ODI World Cup in the UK where the team performed strongly only to be defeated by England at the semi-final stage.

# **Security**

The ACA continued to be involved in overseas pre-tours with Cricket Australia (CA) to assess security and occupational health and safety arrangements.

Players rely on being provided with the information and protection they are entitled to for overseas tours. Players continue to rely on the ACA for its independent advice in this important area.

We shall continue to be as uncompromising as ever in advocating for our members to be provided with a safe and secure workplace and playing environment.

# **Playing Conditions**

The ACA continues to be a key stakeholder in reviewing both international and domestic playing conditions. The ACA makes important contributions to FICA who present the views of the players to the Marylebone Cricket Club (MCC) and International Cricket Council (ICC) who review the laws and international playing conditions. The ACA also plays an important role on the Cricket Australia Playing Conditions Advisory Committee (PCAC) which is the committee responsible for providing recommendations to the CA Board for consideration.

The ACA will continue, with the support of member feedback, to provide considered opinions and recommendations regarding playing conditions, regulations and innovations that help shape and grow the game.

# **MOU Amendments**

At the conclusion of the 2018/19 season the ACA and CA agreed to reallocate funds to allow for the introduction of a number of positive changes for the game in 2019-20.

Most notably, the Players' Parental Leave Policy was negotiated to provide support for new parents who are contracted cricketers. Additionally, the ACA negotiated with CA for several on and off-field changes that will benefit players and the game.

These included:

- 2 more WNCL games per year for the next 3 years
- 1 more Men's 50 over game per year for the next 3 years
- Additional Australia A games for both men and women
- Additional ACRA credits for any additional matches
- A revised 5 game BBL finals structure
- Increased funding and time allocation for female state Player Development Managers.
- Funding and commitment to introduce a National Wellbeing/PDM role.
- Funding for additional research into the Female game, the Pathway and Professional Development and wellbeing.

# Player Issues

Advocacy is one of the ACA's key pillars. The ACA works with Cricket Australia on a number of issues on behalf of the current players.

The ACA worked with players on a number of issues including:

- Overseas T20 tournaments
- Implementing some of the world's best player terms and conditions and minimum standards
- Health Insurance available to domestic female players and State male rookies
- Player transition
- Player workload management
- Player Agent Accreditation Scheme
- Code of Conduct
- Anti-Corruption
- Anti-Doping and Illicit Substances
- Concussion and head trauma
- Approved and disapproved international cricket
- Rules and other regulations



The ACA's overall membership numbers stands at 1,547 at the end of the 2018-19 year. This number is up from our 2017-18 total of 1,513. The ACA continues to enjoy a fantastic working relationship with State Associations in helping us keep track of past players. If permission has been granted by the ACA member, the member's personal information is shared with their State Association/s, with the Associations in turn assisting the ACA with locating past players who are not members.

# **Member Functions**

Season 2018-19 saw tremendous numbers across all states with over 400 members attending. All function where held in conjunction with the State Associations, which included five test matches against India and one ODI against South Africa in Tasmania.

The Australian Cricketers' Association, in conjunction with Cricket Australia, continues to be committed to the development of its athletes on and off the field. The vision is for Australian Cricket to be the leader in professional development and wellbeing in sport internationally.

# Wellbeing Referral Network

The ACA continued to support current and transitioning players in accessing confidential psychology and psychiatry services, with 289 visits during the period (a 62% increase in player consults). A total of \$68, 252 was paid towards wellbeing services with members accessing support in the following areas:

- Depression, stress or anxiety
- Relationship counselling
- Addiction services
- Loss and grief counselling
- Body image
- Adjusting to life transitions, retirement, deselection and injury

## Health Checks

Each year the ACA provides a health screening day in each state. This year they were collaboratively delivered by the Professional Development Program and the Past Player Program.

# Individual Development Plans

The Player Development Program implemented its own career planning tool 'Individual Development Plan' (IDP) that was developed for purpose. The IDP is supported by evidence based research and grounded by theory (Chaos Theory of Careers). The IDP is to be completed by player and PDM on an annual basis and takes an individualised approach to developing a player's skill, knowledge and career confidence.

In its first year of implementation 62% of players undertook the process of assessing themselves across the competencies listed below and created an action plan to support their development priorities:

- Self Awareness
- Industry Exploration
- Education
- Work experience
- Networking



# Elite Athlete Friendly University Network (EAFU)

The ACA continue to be a member of the EAFU. The network was established to identify and promote universities who have responded to the specific needs of elite athletes, essentially assisting to undertake sporting opportunities whilst pursuing and achieving academic excellence.

The EAFU provided assistance to our members in the following areas this year:

- Rescheduling/flexible delivery of exams due to game commitments.
- Assisting players transferring interstate with continuation of their studies.
- A single point of contact for members at their university as opposed to dealing with individual lecturers.

# State Specific Funding

Each States and Territory was provided with \$7500 per program (\$15k per state) to deliver nuanced career, professional and personal development programs to their current players. The flexibility of the funding enables the Player Development Managers in each state to identify the players needs and align them with the services. Some of the programs run during the financial year included:

# Certificate IV in Athlete Wellbeing

For the first time, 15 current and transitioning players were funded to (and 5 Player Development Managers) study an ACA only Certificate IV in Athlete Wellbeing with the `Wellbeing Science Institute'.

The first of three face to face session was held on Friday 8 June, 2019 and participants have 12 months from this date to complete the assessment component of the qualification.

Graduate members will have the opportunity to be involved in delivery of the GamePlan program as wellbeing ambassadors.

# **Transition**

This is the third year the transition program has been running making the full list of transitioning athletes serviced by the ACA close to 130 players.

29 male and 13 female athletes moved into transition in 2018/19. From this list three players got State upgrade contracts and seven continue to hold a W/BBL contract.

Here are some notable transition highlights from 2018/19:

- Two transitioning athletes were appointed roles in the ACA Internship program which has assisted them with their transition away from Cricket
- The majority of these athletes engaged in an exit review meeting with the ACA Transition Manager and remain engaged with the ACA through Education Grants, Work Experience placements and ongoing transitional support eq. CV assistance and check ins.

# **Player Hardship Fund**

The ACA Player Hardship Fund continues to be a source of support for members and their families in times of genuine hardship. This year the Player Hardship Fund provided direct assistance to six members totalling \$27,188.14

Assistance provided to members included:

- Financial grants
- Financial loans
- Health benefits

All Player Hardship Fund assistance is provided on a confidential basis.

The ACA would like to note the outstanding private contri-bution to the Player Hardship Fund in 2018-19 by Peter Ivany AM. Peter contributed significantly, and the ACA sincerely thanks him for his generosity.

# **Past Player Program**

# In its sixth year, the Past Player Program continues to support our past player members in their post-cricket lives.

A suite of services were offered to support each member's personal development, and many were engaged to impart their knowledge and passion for the game to the next generation through paid coaching and Game Development appearances.

#### The Program has two key aims;

The funding for this program comes from a 26% share of the 2015 World Cup profits and a 27.5% share of the 2020 T20 World Cup profits. This was negotiated in the 2012-2017 and 2017-2022 MOU's to continue the legacy of current players' supporting previous generations.

\$1,103,073 was allocated in 2018-19.

# **2018/2019 Highlights**

## Personal Development

- Support in life after cricket more than 67% of past players accessed Health and Wellbeing Grants.
- Support in the hard times 124 members were supported through the Medical Support Scheme for operations and hospital visits.
- Preventative health 257 past players attended over 1,000 appointments at Health Fair Days across the country.

- Inspiring the next generation − 767 ACA Coach appearances were conducted.

# **Personal Development Services**

# Medical Support Scheme

All members can be allocated up to \$500 to cover out of pocket expenses, such as their excess payment for hospital visits.

Members in greater need or requiring more significant procedures can be allocated up to \$2,000.

124 ACA members were supported through this fund to a total of \$71.764.

Members accessed support for a range of medical conditions including the following:

- Knee replacement surgery
- Shoulder reconstruction
- Prostate cancer surgery
- Cataract surgery
- Hip replacement
- Thumb joint replacement
- Kidney failure surgery
- Back operation
- Arthroscopy
- Skin cancer removal

# Wellbeing Counselling

The ACA provides confidential access to counselling services to our membership and their immediate families. This year the service was collaboratively delivered with the ACA's Professional Development Program. 56 sessions were accessed.

The Past Player Program contributed \$14,056

This service has an annual budget of \$15,000.

#### Health Fair Days

Each year the ACA provides a health screening day in each state. This year they were collaboratively delivered with the ACA's Professional Development Program.

Members accessed over 1,000 appointments for skin, eyesight, bone density screening and general check-ups.

The Past Player Program contributed \$50,432 to this initiative, supporting 257 past players and 215 current players. This service has an annual budget of \$70,000.


# Health and Wellbeing Grants

Personal Development Grants for health, wellbeing, education and career-related services were offered to all past players. Members were supported with costs such as attending conferences, completing education and training, increasing their health insurance options, or joining their local gym.

A pool of \$300,000 was available for distribution to members that applied.

A record 832 ACA members were allocated grants. 234 received \$500 and 597 received \$250. A total of \$279,500 was expended.



# **Game Development Program Delivery**

- For ACA members the Game Development Program provided an opportunity to pass on knowledge, passion and expertise through coaching, mentoring and facilitating cricket programs.
- 238 members are registered in the Program.
- 139 members conducted 767 appearances aimed at kids, talented players and coaches.
- That's over 2,650 hours ACA members spent adding value to cricket programs across Australia, exciting and inspiring the next generation of players and coaches.

- ACA members received \$282,151 in appearance fees. The standard fee is \$500, with provisions for extended appearances \$700. An additional \$15,000 was expended on travel subsidies.

# **ACA Masters**



The ACA Masters completed another successful 2018-2019 season.

The tour took place in the Cobram-Barooga region, on the Victorian and New South Wales border in 2018-19.

The ACA Masters cricket program is built around using the star power of past and current elite cricketers, taking them and the game of cricket to the community through tours and matches against regional or representative cricket teams. During each tour the ACA Masters played a T20 match against a local XI, as well as being actively engaged with the community through in 2CRICKET clinics, locally focused PR activities, fundraising and other community activities.

The program again assisted the community by leaving a positive legacy and creating enormous publicity, whilst providing the region with their own personal experience.

The Masters started off the tour of Barooga with a Corporate Golf Day. Cobram – Barooga tourism organised teams of 3 from corporate business within the local area to play 9 holes of golf with one of the Masters players. Wayne Phillips and Trent Johnston took the bragging rights for the first part of the tour.

The Masters then proceeded to get actively involved with young cricketers from the PSSA Carnival at their last game. We had the likes of Andy Bichel bowling to young 12-year olds, Alex Blackwell behind the stumps and Brett Geeves was showing off all his batting skills

Day 2 of the tour saw the Maters split in half to complete two clinics. Cobram Primary School and Finely Primary School had first hand access to the quality coaching from our Masters. Both clinics were help for 2 hours and consisted of over 200 kids in grade 3 and 4.

The tour finished with an T20 match against the locals which saw a great crowd turn out to Barooga Sports Ground for a twilight game. An entertaining game saw the Masters come away with a win. Mark Cosgrove finished with 51, Ben Dunk with 44 while Jason Krezja hit 84 off 20 balls including 10 sixes. Local recruit Ryan Sidebottom found himself with the new ball while Julia Price was handy behind the stumps.

# Player Partnership Fund

In 2014 the ACA, along with the current players, developed the Player Partnership Fund. This fund was a contribution of \$10.75m from the 2012-2017 Adjustment Ledger to fund initiatives that will help strengthen the game as well as benefit ACA members.

Following consultation with Cricket Australia, agreement was reached on delivering initiatives that support the areas of Premier Cricket, Coaching Development, Player Internships, Volunteer Recognition and Female Health

These initiatives have evolved since being first introduced with the following programs delivered in 2018-19 with positive results across the three programs

- ACA Premier Cricket Program
- ACA Coach Development Program
- ACA Internship Program

# **Premier Cricket Program**

The ACA Premier Cricket Program is designed to strengthen Premier Cricket and support ACA members in their post-cricket lives. The Program aims to retain and harness the skill, experience and knowledge of ACA members to identify, instruct and inspire talent through the Premier Cricket pathway.

The program has the following objectives:

- Provide a platform for ACA members to remain in Premier Cricket through playing, coaching and talent identification roles.
- Narrow the gap between Premier Cricket and high performance/ domestic cricket;
- Oreate additional opportunities for clubs to support and enhance existing budgets and structures.
- Grow a sustainable program that ensures Premier Cricket remains the lifeblood of Australian Cricket.
- Retain first-class cricketers in Premier Cricket;
- Provide a higher level of Premier Cricket competition;
- Identify, instruct and inspire the next generation of Australian elite cricketers; and
- To balance Premier Club objectives with the development of emerging talent.

In 2018-19, ACA Premier Cricket Program highlights included:

- \$1 million invested into Premier Cricket;
- 101 clubs received between \$5,000 and \$15,000;
- 183 ACA members involved in the Program
- 46 new roles created within Premier Clubs due to ACA Premier Cricket Funding
- 77 members would not have been involved in Premier Cricket if it wasn't for ACA funding

In its fourth season, the ACA Premier Cricket Program again met and exceeded its targets.

Since 2015, there has been:

- Over \$4 million invested into Premier Cricket;
- 102 clubs received funding;
- 269 ACA members engaged in the Program;
- 357 grants provided to Premier Clubs.

# **Coach Development Program**

Past players play an important role in the development of Australia's current and future cricketers. The ACA continues to support ACA Members who wish to follow coaching as a pathway after playing. Gaining formal knowledge and experience in Cricket Australia's coach accreditation programs is an important part of that development.

#### In 2018/19:

- 11 members were supported in completing CA's Elite Coaching Level 3 course
- 8 members were also offered support in completing CA's representative coaching level 2 courses conducted within the States.

# **Internship Program**

The ACA, in partnership with Cricket Australia and State organisations, has offered ten-week paid sport administration internships for ACA members looking to develop their careers.

In 2018-19, the ACA's commercial activities included the All\*Star Awards, ACA Masters program, and the Allan Border and Belinda Clark Medals - run in conjunction with CA.

# **Player Recognition**

# Allan Border and Belinda Clark Medals

The Allan Border and Belinda Clark Medals, named after two of Australia's greatest captains and cricketers, are awarded to the most outstanding Australian cricketer of the past season.

The Allan Border Medal was first presented at an awards ceremony honouring the nation's top cricketers in 2000. Voting is undertaken by cricketers, the media and umpires. Votes are cast after each game on a 3-2-1 basis. In order to compensate for the uneven number and length of Test, ODI and T20 international matches, and to ensure that players from all three types of the game have a fair chance of winning the award, a weighting system is applied to all votes. Votes are kept strictly confidential and are counted and audited by PricewaterhouseCoopers.

# ACA Captain's MVP Award

2018-19 was the second year of the inaugural Captain's MVP awards for the Sheffield Shield and WNCL competitions.

In each game, the captain's of Sheffield Shield and WNCL teams voted 5-4-3-2-1 on their most valuable players for their respective games, culminating in a Sheffield Shield and WNCL Captain's MVP at the end of the summer.

Jackson Bird won his second consecutive MVP award in the Sheffield Shield, while Tasmania's Georgia Redmayne won the WNCL award.

# 2018-19 Activities Report

This year has been another strong year for the AAA as we seek to deliver on our two key objectives:

- (1) delivering information, best practice and support to our seven member associations and
- (2) representing the collective on issues of communal importance.

In brief review of the AAA activities in 2018/19 the AAA has been committed to the follow key areas:

#### Australian Concussion Consortium

- We have now finalised a formal agreement between the AFL, Rugby Australia, National Rugby League, RMIT and the AAA in regard to the establishment of the Australian Concussion Consortium (ACC).
- This includes the establishment of the Scientific Committee which is bringing together representatives from the codes, independents and AAA representatives in regards to what is best practice in regards to concussion treatment and support.
- The formal establish of the ACC has taken significant time and stakeholder engagement, but we now have a clear mandate to organise and seeking funding for concussion research which traverses several sports and players. Cricket Australia is also engaged in the ACC.

#### AAA Athlete Documentary

 We have continued the filming and production of the AAA documentary which will investigate and interview athletes regarding several areas including mental health, financial stress.

#### Anti-Doping and Integrity in Sport

- The AAA as advocated, provided submissions, and lobbied government and opposition members on the areas of concern and opportunity as a result of the Woods Review into the Integrity of Sport in Australia.
- This has resulted in the established of a strong relations with the opposition members, in particular those in Sport, as well as the first meeting between a Minister of Sport and the AAA representatives.

#### Player Development and Wellbeing

- We have embarked on the challenge, yet beneficial task of establish the AAA Athlete Development Day which is to be launched in November 2019.
- The Day will be focused on the players as people their identity, innate skillsets and mental health, and as professionals – engaging in meaningful professional growth session and networking with engaged employers.

#### Image Tax on Athletes

We have presented a strong submission, in collaboration with our member associations, to the
 Australian Government and Tax Office regarding the
 unjust changes which we're proposed to the taxation
 of the image rights of athletes when licensed to third
 party entities (trusts).

In addition, the AAA provided support and advice to our Members associations in an array of areas as the Members continue to advance, protect and promote the rights of athletes throughout Australia – and internationally – with outstanding skill and professionalism. We have also liaised with athletes in other sports exploring the formation of players associations, including those in athletics, surf lifesaving, and baseball.

As a member of the World Players Association the AAA has been a part of strong developments by World Players' and its affiliates. The AAA continues to be well represented on the WPA committees, including heading up the Player Development area, along with having a member on the Anti-Doping committee.

# Federation of International Cricketers' Associations



# The Federation of International Cricketers Associations (FICA) is the global players' voice in cricket.

FICA was established in 1998 to unite all national players' associations, which protect the interests of professional cricketers throughout the world (there are currently nine). It brings together the world's cricketers, regardless of nationality, religion, political persuasion or race, under an international body focused on matters of general interest to the game and its players. FICA's operational focus is on representing players including in the following areas:

# 1. Global Voice

Professionally representing players' views and opinions to the game (including at ICC level).

E.g.: Global surveying, Player Advisory Groups, Global Employment & Cricket Reports.

# 2. Employment and Contracts

Working hard to ensure that every player receives a contract that is properly negotiated and offers appropriate protections.

E.g: ICC event squad terms, domestic T20 event standard player contracts, players' association negotiation support, agent communications.

# 3. Player Global Safety and Security

Player safety and security is FICA's primary concern.

E.g. Independent security advice (ICC events, international cricket and domestic events), best practice sharing.

## 4. The World Game

Advocating for the best structure of the game and regulations to make cricket as good as it can be for players and fans alike.

# 5. Global Player Welfare

Building a global support network to meet the needs of global cricketers.

E.g: Development of FICA Global Player Welfare platform, best practice and local and global support network.

FICA is governed by its Board and Executive. ACA CEO Alistair Nicholson sits on both. Tony Irish is FICA's Executive Chairman and Tom Moffat is FICA's Chief Operating Officer.

FICA has also established men's and women's Player Advisory Committees, comprised predominantly of current senior International Players nominated by their home players association. The Committees complement FICA's ongoing program of structured engagement with its member players' associations and players around the world to ensure it is accurately representing collective player views and interests at the global level. FICA's current Player Advisory Committees are:



# **Notes To The Financial Statements**

## For The Year Ended 30 June 2019

# 1. Corporate Information

The financial report of Australian Cricketers' Association Inc. ('ACA', 'the Association') for the year ended 30 June 2019 was authorised for issue in accordance with a resolution of the Executive Committee on 31 October 2019.

Australian Cricketers' Association is a not for profit association that is incorporated under the Associations Incorporation Act (SA) 1985 and domiciled in Australia.

The registered office of the Association is:

South Melbourne, Victoria 3205

The ACA is the collective and representative body of past and present first class cricketers in Australia. The principal activities of the Association during the year were to provide benefits and services to its membership, safeguard the rights of members, provide and improve the welfare of members and to promote the sport of cricket.

The ACA took over ownership and control of the Australian Cricketers' Retirement Account ("ACRA") under the new ACRA Rules dated 1 November 2018 within Article 18 of the Memorandum of Understanding. ACRA is the setting aside of funds as prescribed within the MOU to assist players in their transition into post cricket careers.

The assets and liabilities relating to ACRA are represented in the ACA financial report.

# 2. Summary Of Significant Accounting Policies

#### (a) Basis of preparation

The financial report is a special purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting interpretations, other mandatory professional reporting requirements and the requirements of the Associations Incorporations Act (SA) 1985 that have a material effect with the exception of the disclosure requirements of:

AASB 9: Financial Instruments

AASB 117: Leases;

AASB 124: Related Party Disclosures;

AASB 1004: Contributions

The financial report is prepared on a historical cost basis and presented in Australian dollars.

#### (b) Statement of compliance

The Association is considered to be a "not for profit" entity and has prepared the financial statements in accordance

with the requirements regarding "not for profit" entities as contained in Australian Accounting Standards.

#### (c) Income recognition

## (i) Fundraising income

Fundraising income is recognised by ACA upon receipt.

#### (ii) Grant income

Non-reciprocal grant revenue is recognised in profit or loss when ACA obtains control of the grant, in line with the funding agreement, and it is probable that the economic benefits gained from the grant will flow to the entity and the amount of the grant can be measured reliably.

If conditions are attached to the grant which must be satisfied before ACA is eligible to receive the contribution, the recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

When grant revenue is received whereby the entity incurs an obligation to deliver economic value directly back to the contributor, this is considered a reciprocal transaction and the grant revenue is recognised in the statement of financial position as a liability until the service has been delivered to the contributor, otherwise the grant is recognised as income on receipt.

#### (iii) Membership income

Membership income is recognised upon ACA having the right to the entitlement. Life membership revenue is recognised on receipt.

### (iv) Interest income

Interest income is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

#### (d) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash in the Statement of Financial Position comprises cash at bank and short-term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

For the purposes of the Statement of Cash Flows, cash and cash equivalents consist of cash and cash equivalents as defined above, net of outstanding bank overdrafts.

#### (e) Trade and other receivables

Trade receivables, which generally have 30 day terms, are recognised and carried at original invoice amount less an allowance for any expected credit losses.

A simplified approach is used to measure expected credit losses using a lifetime expected loss allowance model.

#### (f) Trade and other payables

Trade and other payables are carried at amortised cost and represent liabilities for goods and services provided to ACA prior to the end of the financial year that are unpaid and arise when ACA becomes obliged to make future payments in respect of the purchase of these goods and services. These amounts are unsecured and are normally settled within 30 days of recognition.

#### (g) Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment is stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. Depreciation is calculated on a Diminishing Value basis over the estimated useful life of the asset as follows:

#### (h) Provisions (excluding employee benefits)

Provisions are recognised when the association has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of past events, when it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and when a reliable estimate can be made of the amount or the obligation.

If the effect of the time value of money is material, provisions are discounted using a current pre-tax rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability.

When discounting is used, the increase in the provision due to the passage of time is recognised as interest expense.

#### (i) Employee benefits

Provision is made for employee benefits accumulated as a result of employees rendering services up to the reporting date. These benefits include wages and salaries, annual leave and long service leave.

Liabilities arising in respect of wages and salaries, annual leave and any other employee benefits expected to be settled within twelve months of the reporting date are measured at their nominal amounts based on remuneration rates which are expected to be paid when the liability is settled. These liabilities are recorded as current in the statement of financial position. All other employee benefit liabilities are measured at the present value of future cash outflows to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date. In determining the present value of future cash outflows, the market yield as at the reporting date on national government bonds, which have terms to maturity approximating the terms of the related liability, are used. These liabilities are recorded as non-current in the statement of financial position.

#### (j) Income tax

The Association is exempt from income tax under the Income Tax Assessment Act (1997).

With respect to ACRA, Both the ACA and Cricket Australia have received professional advice that:

- (i) the investment earnings of ACRA are not subject to taxation; and
- (ii) payments of entitlements to players who are no longer contracted under any Cricket Australia, State Association or BBL Team playing contract made within 12 months of the termination or expiry of their last such contract will constitute employment termination payments.

Consequently, a liability for taxation in relation to the activities of ACRA is not recognised. Personal income taxation will be deducted from payments of entitlements at the time of retirement in accordance with tax rules.

# (k) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of assets or expenses. Receivables and Payables in the Statement of Financial Position are shown inclusive of GST.

#### (l) ACRA Member Entitlements

The ACA took over ownership, management and control of ACRA from 1 November 2018. The provision for ACRA member entitlements is represented by member earnings prescribed under the 2017-2022 Memorandum of Understanding between the ACA and Cricket Australia, investment earnings on the members account throughout the year less any payments made to members.

Member entitlements are recorded in the Statement of Financial Position at fair value which also represents the face value of the liability.

# (m) New or amended Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations adopted

The incorporated association has adopted all of the new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period.

Impact of adoption

AASB 9 Financial Instruments (which make amendments to AASB 101) were adopted using the modified retrospective approach and as such comparatives have not been restated. There was no impact on opening retained profits as at 1 July 2018.

The Executive Committee have determined that there is no material impact, of the new Accounting Standards adopted compared with the previous Accounting Standards, on the current reporting period.

#### (n) New Australian Accounting Standards not yet adopted

At the date of approving the financial report, the following Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations relevant to the Association that have recently been issued or amended but are not yet mandatory, have not been early adopted by the Association for the period ended 30 June 2019.

If the effect of the time value of money is material, provisions are discounted using a current pre-tax rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability.

When discounting is used, the increase in the provision due to the passage of time is recognised as interest expense.

# 17. Contingent Liabilities

The monies received in respect of the Professional Development Fund are to be used for the express purpose of meeting the terms of the agreements governing the grants, including the Memorandum of Understanding. To this extent a contingent liability exists reflecting the requirement for these funds to be utilised to assist the CA, State and Rookie contracted players and other ACA members prepare for life after cricket.

The monies received in respect of the Past Player Game and Personal Development Fund are to be used for the express purpose of meeting the terms of the agreements governing the grants, including the Memorandum of Understanding. To this extent a contingent liability exists reflecting the requirement for these funds to be utilised to support and benefit past player members as well as utilising the knowledge, skill and passion of the ACA membership to develop and grow the game and its players.

The monies received in respect of the Player Partnership Fund are to be used for the express purpose of meeting the terms of the agreements governing the grants, including the Memorandum of Understanding. To this extent a contingent liability exists reflecting the requirement for these funds to be utilised for the betterment of the game of cricket. The guiding principle is that funds are used to build enduring initiatives and programs that benefit ACA members and the game of cricket in general.

The monies received for the Players Hardship Fund are to be used for the express purposes of providing financial support to ACA members and their families. The monies received for the Youth Development Fund are to be used for the express purposes of providing scholarship and training programs. To this extent a contingent liability also exists for both the PHF and the YDF reflecting the requirements for these funds to be utilised for specific purposes.

Bank guarantees in relation to the premises lease are in place as at 30 June 2019 amounting to \$40,117 (2018 \$40,117).

# 18. Player Hardship Fund Donations

A trust entitled "The Australian Cricketers' Association Player Hardship Fund" (the PHF Trust Fund) was established pursuant to a Trust Deed dated 26 July 2011, with Australian Cricketers' Association Player Hardship Fund Pty Ltd ABN 97 443 607 582 (the Trustee) (a wholly owned subsidiary of ACA) as trustee. Current share capital of the PHF Trust Fund is 10 Ordinary Shares valued at \$10 wholly owned by the Australian Cricketers' Association Incorporated.

The trustee for the PHF Trust Fund was endorsed as a Deductible Gift Recipient by the Australian Taxation Office from 26 July 2011. Where previously, ACA had directed that donations be made to the pre-existing Player Hardship Fund held by ACA, following the establishment of the PHF Trust Fund, ACA advised that donations should be directed to the PHF Trust Fund.

# 19. Events After Balance Date

There has not arisen in the interval between the end of the financial year and the date of this financial statement any transaction or event of a material nature that would require amendment to or disclosure in the financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2019.

# 20. Funding of Various Activities

The ACA receives funding revenue both for its ongoing operations and for specific programs. The specific programs for which the ACA is responsible are as follows:

- Professional Development: funding is received from Cricket Australia ("CA") and the Player Payment Pool to assist the CA, State and Rookie contracted players and other ACA members prepare for life after cricket.
- Past Player Game and Personal Development: funding is received from the Player Payment Pool to support and benefit past player members as well as utilising the knowledge, skill and passion of the ACA membership to develop and grow the game and its players

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- Player Partnership Fund: funding is received from the Player Payment Pool to be used for the betterment of the game of cricket. The guiding principle as directed by the players is that funds are used to build enduring initiatives and programs that benefit ACA members and the game of cricket in general.
- Youth Development Fund: the monies received for the Youth Development Fund are to be used for the express purposes of providing scholarship and training programs.
- Player Hardship Fund: the monies received from fundraising activities for the Player Hardship fund are to be used for the express purpose of providing support to ACA members and their families in times of genuine hardship.
- Player Hardship Gift Fund: the trustee for this fund was endorsed as a Deductible Gift Recipient by the Australian Taxation Office and as such donations received are to be distributed in accordance with the guidelines as set out in the Trust Deed.

#### 21. Business Combinations

The Australian Cricketers' Association Inc. ("ACA") and Cricket Australia ("CA") agreed that the ACA would take over ownership, management and control of the Australian Cricketers' Retirement Account ("ACRA") from 1 November 2018 per Article 18.2(b) of the Memorandum of Understanding.

At this time, an amount of \$54,863,147 was transferred from CA to the ACA. The payment represented the aggregate of each individual players ACRA benefits at 1 November 2018 of \$51,375,964 and the retained ACRA surplus of \$3,487,183

The acquisition method of accounting is used to account for business combinations regardless of whether equity instruments or other assets are acquired.

On the acquisition of a business, the consolidated entity assesses the financial assets acquired and liabilities assumed at the acquisition-date.

The difference between the acquisition-date fair value of assets acquired, liabilities assumed and the fair value of the consideration transferred is recognised as goodwill. If the consideration transferred is less than the fair value of the identifiable net assets acquired, being a bargain purchase to the acquirer, the difference is recognised as a gain directly in profit or loss by the acquirer on the acquisition-date.

#### 22. Principles Of Consolidation

The consolidated financial statements incorporate all of the assets, liabilities and results of the Australian Cricketers' Association Inc. ("the parent") and Australian Cricketers Retirement Account ("the subsidiary"). Subsidiaries are entities the parent controls. The parent controls an entity when it is exposed to, or has rights to, variable returns from its involvement with the entity and has the ability to affect those returns through its power over the entity.

From 1 November 2018, the parent obtained 100% control of the Australian Cricketers Retirement Account.

The assets, liabilities and results of its subsidiary are fully consolidated into the financial statements of the group from the date on which control is obtained by the group. Where relevant, intercompany transactions, balances and unrealised gains or losses on transactions between group entities are fully eliminated on consolidation. Accounting policies of subsidiaries have been changed and adjustments made where necessary to ensure uniformity of the accounting policies adopted by the group.
